Key achievements to date:

All 23 classes managed to have at least 2 hours timetabled PE averaged over the academic year 2018 – 2019. This target has been strived for and missed in Attend more Key stage 1 and LSSP competitions in 2019-2020 than 2018-2019. the recent past so it is pleasing to achieve. The provision of a PE specialist from LSSP (Liverpool School Sports Partnership) and a redeployed class teacher as PE Specialist, greatly helped.

CPD provided for all teaching staff by dedicated PE specialist and LSSP specialist, funded from Sports Premium funding. This included training in teaching and evaluating skill based, physically challenging lessons. All Blessed Sacrament PE lessons now have a recognised, consistent structure which fits the needs of our pupils best and can be monitored termly against rigorous standards. .

A variety of new sports were made available thanks to LSSP, the dedicated PE Specialist and opportunities provided by other outside agencies. These included tri golf, quidditch, dodgeball, short tennis, deep water Water Polo, yoga, table tennis, open water swimming.

Very successful 'Power Club' initiative provided by LSSP to focus on and lengage identified pupils who were otherwise reluctant to engage in physical activity.

Intra school activities organised across the year by PE specialist to give all children an opportunity to experience competitive sport. These included cross country, traditional sports day, football and handball.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

Provide more opportunities to try new sports for the children in Key stage 1. because the number did dip compared to the previous year 2017 -2018. Buy in outside providers similar to the Quidditch we provided in KS2.

Use a proportion of Sports Premium Funding, targeted very specifically, to enable some Pupil Premium children to attend paid for after school clubs.

Embed active mile or similar regular vigorous activity in the school day. It has been trialled and evidence from pupil questionnaires showed positive impact but we have yet to successfully make it work due to logistical problems. Deployment of LSSP coach and PE apprentice may provide solutions.

Targeted lunchtime and playtime clubs for example EAL children, girls, SEND, pupil premium, provided by PE apprentice and LSSP coach.

Develop utilisation of My Personal Best tool provided by LSSP.
